# A Reflection

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## Longing for God

If you want God, and long for union with him, yet sometimes wonder what that means or whether it can mean anything at all, you are already walking with the God who comes. If you are at times so weary and involved with the struggle of living that you have no strength even to want him, yet are still dissatisfied that you don't, you are already keeping Advent in your life. If you have ever had an obscure intuition that the truth of things is somehow better, greater, more wonderful than you deserve or desire, that the touch of God in your life stills you by its gentleness, that there is a mercy beyond anything you could ever suspect, you are already drawn into the central mystery of salvation.

Your hope is not a mocking dream: God creates in human hearts a huge desire and a sense of need, because he wants to fill them with the gift of himself. It is because his self-sharing love is there first, forestalling any response or prayer from our side, that such hope can be in us. We cannot hope until we know, however obscurely, that there is something to hope for; if we have had no glimpse of a vision, we cannot conduct our lives with vision. And yet we do: there is hope in us, and longing, because grace was there first. God's longing for us is the spring of ours for him.

# Clergy Notes

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On Wednesday Bishop John issued a Pastoral Letter (click [here](#)), in the light of new Orders from the Provincial Health Officer, Dr. Bonnie Henry, announced on Tuesday.

You will recognise that the manner in which in-church worship is being conducted currently falls within these new directives: masks are worn by everyone, including the choir, except for clergy and readers when speaking. The Wardens and I have considered the alternative options concerning vaccine passports or limiting numbers to 50% of seated capacity, in St. James' case 150 people. Mindful of the spaciousness of the building and the usual attendance numbers, we do not intend to require from those in church sight of vaccine passports. We shall address the other matters in the letter by 31 December. Our primary concern remains the safety of everyone who comes to St. James'.

Accordingly, our capacity will be limited to 150 people, with immediate effect. We shall continue to encourage everyone to respect others' physical distance. For the time being we do not intend to resume Sunday coffee hour. In view of the lower than usual attendance currently, we reckon that we shall be able to host our planned Christmas services.

Last Sunday's Advent Lessons and Carols was an uplifting beginning to this season of expectation and preparation: our thanks go to the choir and the readers for their inspiring offering. I commend the Advent Formation sessions to you.

On Monday 20 December at 7.00 pm there will be a Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols, sung by the choir MOTET. On Christmas Eve, there will be a said Vigil Mass at 4.00 pm. There will then be a Choral & Organ Prelude from 10.00 pm, with Midnight Mass beginning at 10.30 pm. The St. James' Choir & Musicians will offer Charpentier's Messe de Minuit. On Christmas Morning, the Zoom Liturgy at Home will be at 9.00 am, with Solemn Mass in church at 10.30 am. On Sunday 26 December the Zoom Liturgy will be at 9.00 am, including cantors Gerald & Sri; the 10.30 am Mass in church will be said, with organ accompaniment. (There will be no 4.00 pm Vigil Mass on Christmas Day.)

Please continue to pray for our Province at this time, for all who have lost home and livelihood, and for wisdom and discernment for all seeking to rebuild.

## **16 DAYS OF ACTIVISM**

The United Nations' 16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence and abuse is an international campaign. It takes place Nov. 25 (International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women ) to Dec. 10 (Human Rights Day). Started 30 years ago by activists at the Women's Global Leadership Institute, the 16 Days are used by the Mothers' Union and over 6000 organizations from approximately 187 countries to raise awareness of, and call for an end to, gender-based violence in all its forms and in all societies. GBV can affect any person at any time and global statistics demonstrate that women and girls are particularly at risk to a ratio of 1 in 3.

Lord, today we make a commitment to take a stand: to say No more 1 in 3; to use our eyes to see where change needs to be made; to use our voices to challenge injustice in our world. May we support people experiencing abuse, enabling them to reach their full potential and may we call for change. Amen.
